- 2.12 How does IQAC Contribute/Monitor/Evaluate the Teaching & Learning processes: -
- IQAC, through Academic Calendar Committee, ensures that each department receives timetable for the entire semester.
- Faculties are required to maintain diaries of their academic and curricular and extracurricular activities.
- The declaration of completion of the syllabus is obtained from each faculty for every subject at the end of every semester.
- Annual Academic Audit by senior faculties of other colleges along with college IQAC Representative was conducted on 10th June 2017 and feedback was given to respective departments.

• Performance Appraisals:-

Performance Appraisal of Teachers by Students (PATS)

PATS is conducted yearly for regular courses and semester wise for self-financing courses. Minimum 30 per cent of the students are given the PATS forms for appraisal. Three categories of skills of teachers are appraised – one, attitude of teacher towards students; second, core subject-related, teaching and classroom skills and third, additional peripheral skills/ activities. Once data is collected, each teacher analyses the data as per the guidelines given to identify strengths and developmental areas. A copy of the summary of analysis is given to the principal who in turn holds meeting with each department to share the analysis. A copy of the summary of analysis is also submitted to the IQAC office for record.
