## A) INTRODUCTION

The Academic Audit is a college driven model to improve quality processes in teaching and learning and thus enhance students' success. A process that sustains continuous quality improvement of teaching and learning and evaluation. It is the process of evaluating the efficiency and effectiveness of the administrative procedure. It includes assessment of policies, strategies & functions of the various administrative departments, control of the overall administrative system etc. (A. Balasubramanian)

KET's V.G.Vaze College of Arts, Science and Commerce (Autonomous) is one of the leading colleges in Mumbai.

The purpose of this exercise was not merely to assess compliance with prescribed norms, but also to identify institutional strengths, highlight areas for improvement, and recommend measures for continuous enhancement.

## D. Departmental Presentations

### DAY -1

#### 1. DEPARTMENT OF ACCOUNTANCY :

##### OBSERVATIONS:

- The key points of discussion included the monthly teaching plan and student assessment practices, arrangements for compensating missed lectures, initiatives taken towards industry linkage, and the training and placement activities conducted. The auditors also discussed the method of internal assessment, the exposure provided to students in Tally and

Excel, and the concessions or support measures available for students pursuing Chartered Accountancy alongside their studies.

#### **RECOMMENDATIONS:**

- Establish MoUs with industries for collaborative learning.
- Ensure that faculty research papers are published in reputed journals with proper impact factor recognition
- Conduct two class tests and consider the best performance for evaluation.
- Introduce value-added short-term certification courses in Tally and Excel.

### **2. DEPARTMENT OF BUSINESS LAW**

#### **OBSERVATIONS :**

- The discussion with Department of Business Law focused on whether real-world case studies are being shared with students as part of the teaching–learning process.

#### **RECOMMENDATIONS :**

- Encourage students to convert field projects into research publications.
- Encourage students to publish research papers to enhance academic value.
- Under NEP guidelines, incorporate subjects such as Civil Law and Constitution.

### **3. DEPARTMENT OF BUSINESS ECONOMICS**

#### **OBSERVATIONS :**

- Discussions were held on the recording of student progression data, measures adopted by faculty to make the subject engaging, and the conduct of budget-related activities in class. The auditors also enquired about the use of the AICTE database for teaching purposes and the introduction of case studies for students.

#### **RECOMMENDATIONS :**

- Incorporate published case studies or prepare an in-house case study manual, and encourage development of original case studies on contemporary issues with proper documentation.
- Use SIPS (Student/Staff Institutional Projects) as extension activities and publish departmental activities for NAAC documentation and visibility.
- Conduct budget-related activities such as discussions, presentations, and analyses of Union and State Budgets to enhance financial awareness.
- Organize financial literacy workshops for faculty, staff, and students to

- build awareness of budgeting, savings, and investment practices.
- Design and publish an Annual Departmental Magazine covering departmental activities, courses, projects, and analytical write-ups.

#### 4. DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE

##### **OBSERVATIONS :**

- Discussions were held on whether professional assistance from agencies is taken for Ad-Utsav events and whether Ad-Utsav is considered as part of the internal assessment process.

##### **RECOMMENDATIONS :**

- Provide opportunities for students to visit advertising agencies for real-world exposure.
- Encourage students to create virtual portfolios using platforms like Economic Times
- Promote enrolment in advanced SWAYAM/NPTEL courses for higher learning beyond the curriculum.
- Organize visits to NSE and BSE for practical learning, and encourage students to pursue NISM Certificate.

#### 5. DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL STUDIES (EVS)

##### **OBSERVATIONS :**

- Discussions focused on the existence of a Green Club in the college and the range of environmental activities conducted within the campus.

##### **RECOMMENDATIONS :**

- Compile and publish data collected by Commerce students (surveys and field visits) as it offers valuable
- Encourage students to present papers based on collected data.
- Establish a Commerce Data Club for systematic collection, processing, and analysis to create a useful data
- Collaborate with NGO's and external agencies for publishing research work.

#### 6. DEPARTMENT OF MATHEMATICS

##### **OBSERVATIONS :**

- Discussions were held on the efforts taken for remedial coaching, the evaluation of bridge courses conducted for BT students, and the bridge courses designed for B.Com students.

### **RECOMMENDATIONS :**

- Provide remedial coaching for students from non-mathematical backgrounds to strengthen fundamentals.
- Introduce bridge courses through SWAYAM and departmental assessments to support diverse backgrounds.
- Strengthen follow-up mechanisms to identify students requiring remedial support.
- Encourage faculty to increase the number of research paper publications.
- Conduct Faculty Development Programmes (FDPs).
- Continue the department's strong contribution towards research publications.

## **7. & 8. BACHELOR'S IN ACCOUNTING AND FINANCE (BAF), BANKING AND INSURANCE (BBI), AND BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION (BBA) AND MANAGEMENT STUDIES (BMS)**

### **OBSERVATIONS :**

- The audit team conveyed their appreciation to the faculty for their dedicated efforts.

### **RECOMMENDATIONS :**

- Engage start-up entrepreneurs as guest speakers to share their entrepreneurial journeys with students.
- Integrate Generative AI as a learning aid while ensuring students are guided on its ethical and effective usage.

## **9. BACHELOR OF SCIENCE IN INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY (B.SC. IT)**

### **OBSERVATIONS :**

- During the academic audit, discussions were held on the measurable outcomes of the Avishkar lectures conducted for students, the faculty research work undertaken in the department, and the reasons for the comparatively higher failure rate in the First Year.

### **RECOMMENDATIONS :**

- Extend AI-related expertise and support to other departments.
- Facilitate ICTE training sessions for faculty members across disciplines.
- Encourage faculty to publish collaborative, co-authored research papers with colleagues from other departments.

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## 10. POST GRADUATE DIPLOMA IN PERFUMERY AND COSMETIC MANAGEMENT (PGDPCM)

### OBSERVATIONS :

- Discussions were held on the sanctioned intake capacity of the program and the structure and facilitation of the internship process. The audit team also commended the department for achieving 100% placement.

### RECOMMENDATIONS:

- Motivate students to contribute more actively to research through the publication of research papers.

## 11. BACHELOR OF ARTS IN MULTIMEDIA AND MASS COMMUNICATION (BAMMC)

### OBSERVATIONS :

- Discussion was held on the factors contributing to the lower enrolment in TY Journalism as compared to TY Advertising.

### RECOMMENDATIONS :

- Initiate the development of an in-house magazine led by Journalism students.
- Introduce AI-based tools and applications for Advertising students. (A short-term course in this area is under development and will be launched in A.Y. 2025–26.)

## 12. BACHELOR OF VOCATION (B.VOC.)

### OBSERVATIONS :

- Discussions was held on the intake capacity of the program and whether the department has approached reputed tourism agencies for student placement opportunities.

## DAY 2

### 1. DEPARTMENT OF ENGLISH

### OBSERVATIONS:

- Discussions were held on syllabus revision, Universities to be referred for guidelines on the same, USP of the students.

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### **RECOMMENDATIONS :**

- Refer to Ashoka, Flame and other reputed Universities for Liberal Arts syllabi.
- The status of syllabus on global competency should be studied upon by the Department.
- Inter-departmental activities should be done with other departments.
- Students should be guided for further studies.

## **2. DEPARTMENT OF HINDI**

### **OBSERVATIONS :**

- Interdepartmental activities are praised.
- Discussion took place on USP of the students and working of the Hindi Sahitya Parishad,
- BAF and BBI students are trained for bhasha kaushalya and presentation skills in Hindi

### **RECOMMENDATIONS :**

- The department should strive for introducing Hindi as Major subject.

## **3. DEPARTMENT OF MARATHI:**

### **OBSERVATIONS:**

- Strengths of the department: Vachan Katta, Marathi Vangmay Mandal, Veethi - various competitions are held for Marathi and Non-marathi students
- Students' strength has improved because of NEP.

### **RECOMMENDATIONS :**

- All criteria in the "Department in Nutshell" are applicable, so do not put NA in any criteria.

## **4. DEPARTMENT OF PSYCHOLOGY:**

### **OBSERVATIONS:**

- Discussion took place on working of Counselling Cell and its services, joint activity conducted by Counselling Cell and Pradnya Parisar Prakalp and managing admissions in FYBA (considering the huge demand)

### **RECOMMENDATIONS :**

- Fee structure of aided section should be revisited.
- To start MA program as soon as possible.

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## 5. DEPARTMENT OF SOCIOLOGY :

### OBSERVATIONS:

- Discussion about the strengths of the department: Focus on experiential learning,
- games and group activities, internship programs offered to the students and emphasis
- on Introduction of Social Work as the VSEC paper research.
- The number of failures in the TY paper "Sociology of Gender" raised concerns.
- Discussion about the syllabi that were referred to for drafting Social Work course.

### RECOMMENDATIONS :

- It was suggested that the department should collaborate with NSS for extension work
- More research work is required to be done by the department.
- To decrease the number of failures, some remedial classes and coaching must be given to the students & experience based learning for papers like "Sociology of Gender" can be introduced.
- Effort should be made for connecting the theoretical studies to the practical applications & relating it to the real world for reducing the amount of failures.
- Collaborate with - NGO Praja Foundation

## 6. DEPARTMENT OF ECONOMICS:

### RECOMMENDATIONS :

- Introduction of Mathematics and Statistics can also be taught to B.Sc. students along with the BA students
- To expand the Economics courses beyond Arts & Commerce faculties.
- The department should explore the possibility of the changing the conventional nomenclature (Macroeconomics and Microeconomics) to non-conventional.
- Short descriptions need to be written for the courses offered.
- To collaborate with the Psychology department to introduce inter-disciplinary course/s like Consumer Psychology of Economics

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## 7. DEPARTMENT OF POLITICAL SCIENCE:

### RECOMMENDATIONS :

- Apart from Arts students, students from Science and other faculty should be encouraged to be a part of the departmental activities. A record of these students should be maintained.
- Mention the topics of the Poster making competition & add the categories of books kept for Book Exhibition in the Audit PPT.
- Undertake some research projects
- Department should conduct various activities related to SDGs.
- To apply for ICSSR grant for research projects.

## 8. DEPARTMENT OF HISTORY:

### OBSERVATIONS:

- The department started with the Open Book Test **on experimental basis**.

### RECOMMENDATIONS :

- The start up idea by Ms. Jaee Bhat- Taste Craft, can be considered as a CC component in NEP.

## 9. DEPARTMENT OF BIOTECHNOLOGY:

### RECOMMENDATIONS :

- The department should obtain the statistical data regarding the placements of the students.
- The department should work more on conducting research.
- The Titles of the dissertations done by the students at Masters level should also be mentioned in the PPT along with their brief results.
- Students' areas of training, dissertation work taken up by the students should be mentioned in detail in the PPT.
- The Department should seriously think and act on consultancy to fetch revenue for the college.

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## 10. DEPARTMENT OF CHEMISTRY:

### OBSERVATIONS:

- There was a discussion about the sanctioned students strength and the management of departmental workload. It was observed that the workload is managed due to the PG programmes offered by the department.

### RECOMMENDATIONS :

- UG syllabus can be made more competitive which can align with current industry trends & competitive standards. Topics that enhance employability & research aptitude should be included in the syllabus.
- Faculty members should be encouraged for consultancy services by using their expertise in the field. Potential areas for consultancy such as analytical services must be identified.
- Induction programs should be conducted for the new students and it should be highlighted.
- Formal collaborations with other institutes for research & student exchange must be taken by the department.
- The department should implement practices related to Green Initiative & highlighting these initiatives to promote awareness and sustainability among students & staff.
- The Department should seriously think and act on consultancy to fetch revenue for the college.

## 11. DEPARTMENT OF PHYSICS:

### OBSERVATIONS :

- There was a discussion on various measures taken to increase the student strength by organizing various guest lectures, guest & alumni interactions. The department also talked about collaborating with junior college teachers for increasing student strength in FYBSc Physics.

### RECOMMENDATIONS :

- The department should introduce IKS in Physics department if possible.
- To conduct more activities such as the Stargazing workshop.
- To visit nearby colleges and collaborate with junior college departments of Vaze college to help in increasing the numbers of the students in FY.

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## 12. DEPARTMENT OF ZOOLOGY

### OBSERVATIONS :

- Initiatives to raise awareness about environmental conservation were conducted both independently and through interdepartmental collaborations.

### RECOMMENDATIONS :

- More inter-departmental collaborations and activities should be taken up by the department especially with respect to biodiversity conservation.
- Activities of Science Association should be written and highlighted in the PPT.

## 13. DEPARTMENT OF BOTANY:

### RECOMMENDATIONS :

- To mention the important decisions taken in the departmental meetings and BOS meetings.
- To consider the number of students who appeared for the exam and not the students who were absent or did not appear in the results analysis.
- Include the list of organisations in the PPT with whom the MOUs have been signed.

## D. Overall Recommendations for all the Departments

### DAY 1 :

- a) Encourage faculty and students to publish research papers, case studies, and departmental activities in reputed journals or magazines for academic enrichment and institutional visibility
- b) Introduce value-added short-term certification courses and promote enrollment in SWAYAM/NPTEL and other advanced courses for skill enhancement.
- c) Strengthen industry linkages through MoUs, visits, workshops, and collaborative projects to provide practical exposure
- d) Organize interactive and experiential learning activities such as case studies, surveys, projects, and budget/field-related exercises to make learning more engaging.
- e) Conduct Faculty Development Programmes (FDPs), remedial/bridge courses, and capacity-building initiatives for both faculty and students.

**DAY 2:**

- a) FY, SY and TY results should be presented in a consolidated manner along with individual course results. (Number & Graphs)
- b) Add page numbers for the PPT for better navigation of the slides.
- c) The Departmental Activities (From-A) file should be crisp and catchy. Avoid too much content.
- d) Along with the dates in the departmental meetings- important decisions taken in the meetings should be written. The same should be done for all BOS meetings.
- e) Result analysis must only show the number of students who APPEARED for the examination, and not the absentees.
- f) Summary of all paper presentations and publications in one single slide should be presented for a single summary.
- g) For teacher and student researchers, "Titles" of their research papers should also be mentioned in the PPT.

## **E. General Recommendations**

1. The college should explore scope of consultancy.
2. Inter-disciplinary innovative courses are to be started.
3. Gender /Environmental/Green Audits are to be done.
4. Academic Calendar should be published on college website.
5. The college website must ensure accessibility for persons with disabilities and provide a seamless browsing experience on mobile devices.be disabled and mobile friendly.
6. Revise the fee structure to support academic development.
7. Introduction of ERP for better governance.
8. Major academic departments should develop and offer add-on courses to students. Alternatively, the college can also bring in professional institutes as education partners to offer skill based/certificate courses to students.
9. The college should strengthen the social media platform to primarily highlight academic achievements, extracurricular activities, student and

staff success stories, and community engagement initiatives.

## F. Observations of Student Interaction

### Commendations given by students:

1. Students are satisfied with the regular teaching-learning and the co-curricular activities that they are given an opportunity to participate in.
2. They are given orientation at the beginning of the academic year
3. Students from self-financed courses have the classrooms with good ICT facilities
4. Students are given opportunities for internships and placements since there is a strong Placement Cell.
5. They enrol in SWAYAM courses for online learning, which is very well tracked
6. They have a mechanism for reporting grievances

### Recommendations given by students for improvement of college:

1. Washrooms have to be much cleaner (This point was emphasized unanimously by all the students present).
2. Sanitary pad vending machine has not been working.
3. There should be a changing room for students who practice in the gym or for sports training.
4. Canteen needs to be more hygienic and the quality of the food should be monitored as compared to the price that is charged. There should be a provision for Jain food.
5. More classrooms should be with AV facility and the ones that have, need to be in good and working condition.

### Remarks by:

Prof. (Dr.) Roshan D'Souza:

Students were very interactive and well-motivated. However, there were no science students. Therefore, feedback regarding laboratory facility, research at UG and PG level could not be gauged.




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
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
