Designated persons of the institute such as the Principal, VicePrincipal, Registrar, IQAC Coordinator and Examination Committee Chairperson have access to data generated by the MIS. The college also has LAN and uninterrupted Internet and WIFI facilities to backup the MIS. • The college has employed the services of S3 Soft Tech Solutions in this regards to provide office management software and result preparation software. Tasks such as pr admission student data entry, meritlist generation, fee receipt generation, cancellation and admission and refund, seating arrangement for examination, generation of leaving certificate, NOC and Bonafide certificate and SMS sending facility are made effective with the help of office management software. Results preparation software is very handy in collecting student data from office, generation of roll numbers, and marks entry for various exams, processing of results and printing of results. • The college also employees Public Financial Management System (PFMS) which is a financial management platform developed by the office of the Controller General of Accounts. It provides interface with the Core Banking System (CBS) of banks, to provide realtime reporting of banking transactions. It is helpful in capturing all financial data of the

institution and in effective tracking of fund flow to the lowest level of implementation. It is also used to monitor fund utilization and for greater transparency of expenditure. • The college office also uses an accounting software based on Tally. • For the effective disbursement of monthly salary Monis software and Sevarth system of UGC are used. Monis software is used for offline salary calculation of all degree college teaching and nonteaching staff. Sevarth system of UGC is used for online salary calculation and submission. Grant is released on the basis of online submission of bills. Salary grant is received in the salary account of the college with the bank and then credited to accounts of staff on the basis of the bill for net amount submitted.

• Continues internal evaluation system is continued in all self financing courses, PGDPCM and all PG courses including MCOM MSC. These reforms have been implemented by the affiliating university . • However within the 40 marks internal component the college uses various assessments method such as presentations assignments to make the test more challenging and interesting for the advance learners. • For effective administration, dedicated non teaching staff members are included in the examination committee and they are continued for a minimum of 3 years so as to make them learn various aspects of examinations. • Paper setters are made to proof read all the papers to eliminate all errors in printing. • To prevent leakage of papers during printing, and inhouse printing mechanism has been developed. Generation of fake certificates is completely prevented as exam software is password protected and is accesses only to one or two senior staff members. • College continues with the internal assessment pattern for Applied Component Papers at third year level and for the FC paper at FY and SY level for all the faculties. For internal assessment of the Applied component as well as for FC paper, a great degree of flexibility is enjoyed by the teacher with innovative evaluation methods such as projects, presentations and assignments. For the Ph.D. programmes the pre Ph.D. coursework is evaluated totally on progressive evaluation scheme where the scholars are assessed on the basis of internal tests, presentations, seminars and writing of research papers.

6.1 – Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 – Mention two practices of decentralization and participative management during the last year (maximum 500 words)

1) Administrative and Academic Management of College. College is managed with Principal at the topmost level of the hierarchy. Vice Principal occupies the second level of the hierarchy. Heads of the various Departments form the third

tier followed by staff members of each department. In the monthly meeting of College Executive Committee (CEC) involving management, Principal, Vice Principal and representative of nonteaching staff, important issues are discussed and decisions are taken. Every month HODs meeting is called wherein each department head shares monthly teaching, curricular, extracurricular activities of the department and individual staff members' teaching and academic activities within and outside of the college. On this occasion Principal shares important decisions taken at the higher managerial levels to the heads of the department. And discuss important issues and problems. Within a short period of HODs meetings, department meetings are held and information disseminated in the HODs meeting is shared with each member of the department for their information and action. In these meetings teaching sessions and departmental activities are also planned. Each department functions independently and enjoys the freedom to organize teaching sessions, adopt their teaching methodologies and to organize their activities keeping in mind vision and mission statement of the college and goals and objectives drawn from it. The college has College Development Committee (CDC), a statutory committee, that plans and monitors overall academic, administrative and infrastructure growth of the college. Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) is an advisory for the Principal. It is an independent unit in the college, responsible for identifying deficiencies and enhancing quality by developing systems for administrative and academic functioning. The other statutory bodies Examination Committee, Gymkhana, Student Council, WDC and ICC function independently towards students' issues and ensure participation of students in decision making as a member of IQAC and CDC in planning and execution of various activities. On the side of administration, registrar is the in charge, who is supported by office staff. Principal also has meeting with nonteaching staff for sharing information and addressing the issues faced by the administrative staff. Departments of Science have laboratories which have a defined administrative structure. Laboratory assistant and attendants look after technical duties, laboratory stores including procurement, asset and petty cash management, safety and security of the laboratory, besides assisting the HODs in maintaining student records, records of research funding. 2) Management of Cocurricular and Extracurricular Activities College has 22 student centric committees for organizing activities to accomplish personality development of the students. Staff members work as convenors for each activity by rotation for 3 years. The committee functions independently with convenor, its members and student volunteers conceptualizing and executing the activities keeping in mind vision, mission statement and goals of the institution. Dimensions is the annual intercollegiate festival organized by a core committee of student volunteers that looks into various aspects such as marketing, sponsorship, event planning, logistics, security and hospitality. All decisions regarding the event are taken and executed by student volunteers in consultation with committee of teachers.

i) Alternate Energy: solar panels installed on the terrace which produces -Watts of energy ii) Green Practice: Plant diversity in the campus: College has a green house and plantation of vegetables, aromatic, medicinal, ornamental, horticultural and germplasm plants. Vetiver, lemon grass and Citronella are also planted for extraction of their oils. Patchouli plants are produced under plant tissue culture programme for institutionindustry interface. Vanamahotsav by NSS Number of trees planted: 320 Plantation in the adopted village Bendshil on 4th July and 6th July 2018 iii) Phased transition from normal bulbs and tubes to LED lights (from 45 watts consumption 23 watts) and from heavier fans to lighter power saver fans. iv) Canteen waste is collected and disposed by BMC on a daily basis. It is segregated into biodegradable and nonbiodegradable waste. Some part of the biodegradable waste is also used in the vermiculture compost plant situated in the campus. The manure generated is used in the maintenance of the garden in the college. v) Laboratory waste and biohazardous waste In the cosmetology lab, the chemical waste of creams, lotions and perfumes is collected and sent to the incinerators of the BMC garbage disposal department which burns the waste electrically at high temperature to prevent carbon fume emission. In chemistry lab, small quantities of waste acid and base chemicals less than 50g are neutralized and discarded. Bigger quantities of more hazardous waste chemicals are handed over to the safety department of S H Kelkar Company for effective management. Small quantities of waste such as sodium and sodium hydride are effectively decomposed by treating them with Methanol. Sodium Methoxide thus formed is neutralized and discarded. Solvents recovered from the reactions are distilled and reused. vi) Paper waste is sold twice a year to declutter the office and to facilitate their effective recycling. vii) Garden and green waste is used for the verimiculture plant. viii) Plastic waste in the form of bottles and wrappers are collected and handed over to BMC for disposal ix) Green Karma exchange offer: 650 plastic bags were collected in exchange of saplings. x) Water harvesting with the run off water from terrace collected in a 5000 liters tank. Water from cooling and filtration units collected and reused in garden.

2. Research: The Differentiator with the Focus on Social Welfare Goals:

- To establish Vaze College as a front runner in research and a knowledge hub across specialties with state of the art laboratories, facilities and libraries so as to attract talent for research and to retain and provide encouragement to the in house talent
- To undertake socially as well as commercially relevant research projects
- To transfer research from Lab to industry and to Land
- To establish linkages for Backward and Forward integration
- To establish linkages with industry and Institutes of National importance

Ongoing Research Activities :

- Scientific Research Centre (SRC) was established in 1991 as a special purpose vehicle for research in the emerging areas of Biotechnology and Cosmetology so as to realize his dream of social responsibility. Today, SRC carries impeccable credentials like approval from Department of Science and Industrial Research (DSIR), recognition by FDA and rating by CRISIL.
- Advanced Research Laboratory for Natural and Synthetic Chemistry was established to synthesis and develop new agents which were effective against various diseases.
- Additional laboratories and facilities were established through the grants under schemes like UGC - BSR, CPE, DST FIST, DBT Star scheme for promotion of research at UG level.
- Perfumery and Cosmetology laboratories were built to develop formulations for small industries.
- SRC, Advanced Chemistry Lab and Perfumery and Cosmetology department take up socially relevant projects and such other projects where contribution to the growth of industries can be through the original research or through improvement in the processes. Special efforts are made for forward integration by encouraging researchers from other institutions to carry out their research work and to get exposure to new technology. The laboratories and in house expertise is made available to them. SRC has standardized protocols for cultivation and postharvest processing of various aromatic crops and have demonstrated the same in various parts of the country. DBTGOI provided project formulation budget and has also sanctioned the project at a total cost of Rs.143.83 lacs for 4 years duration. The project involved standardization of agro technologies under local conditions for five aromatic crops viz. Lemon grass (Cymbopogon flexuosus), Citronella (Cymbopogon winterianus), Palmarosa

(Cymbopogon martini), Patchouli (Pogostemon cablin) and Geranium (Pelargonium graveolens) demonstration on 50 acres at farmers fields, capacity building of farmers, setting up two distillation units for value addition through extraction of essential oil and arranging marketing tieups for its buyback through Unati and Keva Biotech • Researchers in the Advanced Research Laboratory for Natural and Synthetic Chemistry have successfully developed antimalarial agents. Antidiabetic activities are also established. • Department of Botany carried out carbon dioxide sequestration using micro algae in collaboration with ICT DBT center for energy, biofuels.

7.3 – Institutional Distinctiveness

Dimensions, the annual youth cultural festival organized by the college is a distinctive event. It has entered its 25th year and it is a unique event that provides a platform for the student organizers to have a first hand learning experience in event management. The event attracts a footfall of around 7000 students from around 80 colleges from the city and its suburbs. Nearly 1600 participants compete in 30 events. Dimensions is also a brand promotion niche as it attracts nearly 25 advertisers and sponsors. The event trains the student volunteers in various departments such as hospitality, logistics, cultural promotions, event designing, celebrity management, PR, media relations, back office, accounts, administration, marketing, technical support, souvenir printing, branding, anchoring and security management. The event also ties up with NGOs to give it a social service angle. For many years, it has been one of the reasons for students to seek admission in the college. This event thus imparts life training opportunities at a young age for the student organizers and participants in line with one of the objectives of the institution - to ensure the comprehensive well rounded development of students by developing leadership abilities and in using knowledge in real life situations. The college has center for Perfumery study and it conducts a postgraduate diploma in Perfumery and Cosmetics (PGDPCM). This course also offers 100 placement for the learners apart from imparting training in efficacy testing of various perfumery and cosmetic compounds. PGDPCM library has stock braille books and braille software to train the visually challenged in olfactory skills in order to enhance their employ ability. The college also has 8 Ph.D. centers, facilitating vertical academic progression in English, History, Physics, Zoology, Botany, Chemistry, Advanced Chemistry and BioTechnology with a total of 39 research scholars pursuing their doctoral degree in college.

College will introduce online submission of admission forms and online fee payment. 7. College plans to conduct induction program for the students at the entry level whereby they will be given information regarding attendance rules, activity groups in the college , student support mechanisms and examination pattern . 8. Structured PATS (Performance Appraisal of teachers by students) and SSS will be conducted annually. Feedback thus obtained will be used effectively to improve the quality of teachinglearning process. 9. A workshop on safety and disaster management with safety drills for students and staff.
